

Return to Vibrancy Announcement:

Eighteen months before her death from tuberculosis on September 30th 1897, Thérèse experienced the darkening of her faith. Thérèse was not alone in suffering from spiritual insecurity and this affliction settled in for varying periods on more than a few occasions.

In spite of the darkening of her faith, she was content to endure her trial knowing it was vastly more important to be where and what God wanted her to be. For Thérèse, spiritual doubts were not stumbling blocks; she used them as stepping-stones. Thérèse, described her spiritual combat as a trial that God permitted her to undergo.

Saint Thérèse said: "The greatest honour God can do a soul is not give it much, but to ask much of it."

Offering of the Mass



By virtue of the "communion of saints," the Church commends the dead to God's mercy and offers her prayers especially the holy sacrifice of the Eucharist, on their behalf.

Chief Yellow-quill signed an adhesion to Treaty 4 on August 24, 1876. There are approximately 2800 members who live on and off reserve. In March 2011, over 16,000 acres of Treaty Land Entitlement (TLE) lands were converted to reserve status by Canada. TLE land refers to land that was promised in Treaty 4 but never received by the Nation. <u>Yellow Quill Bison Ranch (https://yqfn.ca/yellow-</u>

<u>guill-first-nation/projects/</u>) is owned and operated by the Yellow Quill First Nation.
