

Ascension of the Lord

"No one has ascended into heaven but he who descended from heaven, the Son of man" (Jn 3:13). Our Lord ascends to heaven to prepare a place for us, His disciples. At the Ascension the Church learns the true meaning of her identity and we learn the full implications of Christian discipleship. The Ascension marks a point of transition; for what was called discipleship before Easter, is now more completely understood as mission. As we heard in the Gospel, "Jesus appeared to the eleven, and he said to them, 'Go into all the world and proclaim the good news to the whole creation'" (Mk 16:15). Discipleship entails a participation in our Lord's mission of salvation. Mission for the service of the world is the fulfilled discipleship of our Lord Himself for He was sent by the Father. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. For God sent his Son into the world, not to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him" (Jn 3:16-17).

A Word About Trauma...

Trauma and associated words are being used more now than ever. Do we know the origins of these words? Are their meanings different now than when they were first used? Each week we will explore a trauma-associated word's origins, meanings and evolution.

Complex Trauma

The term complex trauma describes both children's exposure to multiple types of pervasive and chron- ic traumatic events that involve violence, betrayal, exploitation, and loss, such as maltreatment and living in an unsafe family, community, or school settings, as well as the wide-ranging, long-term impact of this exposure. Complex trauma can disrupt the child's secure bonding with caregiver(s), as well as the development and formation of crucial competencies, positive relationships, and a clear sense of self.

Is there a contradiction between Creation & Evolution?

Catechism Text: CCC # 159 & 390.

Sacred Scripture: To assist in reading Genesis, refer to CCC # 390.

Pope Pius XII: Of the Human Race, *Humani Generis* (1950): the Church does not ban the theory of evolution when it's understood that all things are created by God and the human soul is directly created by God.

St. Augustine: Wherever truth is found, it belongs to God.

FAQ: Is the *Catechism* an example of the collegiality of the bishops?

Yes. The collegiality of the Bishops that's presided over by the Bishop of Rome was a truth professed by Vatican II. The Synod of Bishops has been a type of episcopal collegiality since the Council. In an address, on April 30, 1983, Pope John Paul II refers to the Synod as an expression and effective tool of episcopal collegiality ..." The *Catechism* is a direct result of collegiality through the Synod of Bishops.
