Did you know... Pheasant Rump First Nation is a Nakota band with approximately 60 members (per the 2016 Census) in the Moose Mountain area near Kisbey. In 1901, Canada stopped recognizing

Pheasant Rump as a First Nation after Canada wrongfully amalgamated Ocean Man, Pheasant Rump, and White Bear First Nations. In February 2022, Pheasant Rump was officially recognized as a Treaty 4 First Nation confirming that it has existed since 1875. In 2021, the Nation held an event recognizing Canada's first sasktoday.ca/south/local-news/pheasant-rump-nakota-first-nation-marks-truth-and-reconciliation-day-4480350where all participants were gifted with an orange shirt recognizing the injustices and impacts of Indian Residential Schools.

Trauma and associated words are being used more now than ever. Do we know the origins of these words? Are their meanings different now than when they were first used? Each week we will explore a trauma-associated word's origins, meanings and evolution.

Nightmare (n.) nahyt-mair naıt.mer

The word nightmare is defined as a terrifying dream in which the dreamer experiences feelings of helplessness, extreme anxiety, sorrow, etc. It is derived from the Old English c. 1300, "an evil female spirit afflicting men (or horses) in their sleep with a feeling of suffocation," compounded from night + mare. In mid-16c. from the incubus to the suffocating sensation it causes. Sense of "any bad dream" is recorded by 1829; that of a "very distressing experience." The word nightmare is cognate with the Dutch term nachtmerrie and German Nachtmahr.

What is National Indigenous Peoples Day (NIPD)?

June 21 is National Indigenous Peoples Day. This is a day for all Canadians to recognize and celebrate the unique heritage, diverse cultures and outstanding contributions of First Nations, Inuit and Métis peoples. The Canadian Constitution recognizes these three groups as Aboriginal peoples, also known as Indigenous peoples.

Although these groups share many similarities, they each have their own distinct heritage, language, cultural practices and spiritual beliefs.

In cooperation with Indigenous organizations, the Government of Canada chose June 21, the summer solstice, for National Aboriginal Day, now known as National Indigenous Peoples Day. For generations, many Indigenous peoples and communities have celebrated their culture and heritage on or near this day due to the significance of the summer solstice as the longest day of the year.
