Stewardship Bulletin Bit March 27, 2022 4th Sunday of Lent

"No longer was there manna for the Israelites, who that year ate of the yield of the land of Canaan."

Joshua 5:12

Over the forty years that the Israelites journeyed through the desert, God provided them with manna to eat. As soon as they were able to enjoy the fruits of the Promised Land the manna ceased. Likewise, God's blessings to us may change over the years but it is important to trust that God will always provide us with all that we need

Lent: A Brief History Lesson



Church historians tell us that by the end of Solution the fourth century, a forty day period of fasting was observed in parts of the church in commemoration of Christ's forty days

in the desert. Later this developed into a penitential season in preparation for Easter. Lent had two emphases: it was the time of formation and preparation for the catechumens (those seeking entrance into the church) and it was a time of reconciliation for those members of the church whose sins had separated them from God and the church..

Liturgical Math: Counting Forty Days

Mathematically speaking, there are 46 days between Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday. So how did we get forty? It was developed not by means of math but by theology. Every Sunday is Easter, even during the Lenten season, for every Sunday is a memorial of the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus. When we subtract the six Sundays of Lent from the total we end up with forty.

Praver

Prayer is described as the raising of the mind and heart to God or conversing with God. Lent is a time to make a conscious daily effort to pray more and with greater regularity. There are many ways to pray in Lent:

prayer daily either individually or with your family, celebrate the Sunday Eucharist and if possible the daily Eucharist, make a retreat make a pilgrimage to a holy place, commit to spiritual reading.

Standing up to corporate power in Honduras



The People and Planet First campaign is about helping communities stand up to corporate power. In Honduras, as in much

of the Global South, corporations often threaten and criminalize activists who speak up against their abuses.

The Lenca Indigenous leader Víctor Vásquez was imprisoned for fighting the corporate takeover of his people's ancestral territory. Development and Peace's partner, the Honduran Centre for the Promotion of Community Development (CEHPRODEC), helped free him from jail.

Another partner, Caritas Choluteca, trains and accompanies community leaders in advocating for policies that respect human rights and the environment. Recently, they got mayoral election candidates to undertake to declare the municipality of Orocuina a mining-free zone if elected. On March 28th as the encounter begins, in solidarity with the Indigenous Fire Keepers keeping the Sacred Fire in your region and across this land, we invite all of you to light a fire or a candle and to pray, wherever you may be: at home, at work, school, at church. The time zone for Saskatchewan has been designated from 3:00 to 6:00 PM. We encourage parishes to open their doors during this time for people to pray: there could be a time of Adoration, the Rosary, or silent prayer.
